## 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time

**First Reading:** Malachi 1:14-2:2, 8-10  
**Second Reading:** 1 Thessalonians 2:7-9, 13  
**Gospel:** Matthew 23:1-12

**Reflection:** As autumn moves to winter and the days get shorter, we seek ways to bring light into our lives. Everyone recognizes the contrast between the glow of one candle and complete darkness, for a single candle can make a difference in how and what we see.

In today's readings, we cannot fail to note the contrast between Paul's attitude in the second reading and that of the scribes and Pharisees of the gospel.

The scribes and Pharisees of whom Jesus speaks are focused entirely on themselves: how they might be honoured and recognized. Yet they do nothing to earn this, but only lay burdens on the people. Their focus on themselves is in stark contrast to Paul's attitude toward the Thessalonians. Paul made no demands on the community. He was gentle with them and so reflected the light and warmth of God. We can imagine that the community responded not only to what Paul said but to how he lived, and so recognized Paul's words as words of God.

These readings lead us to ponder our own lives, to see whether how we live reflects the attitude of the priests, scribes, and Pharisees or that of Paul. As Eucharistic people we, like Paul, are invited to proclaim, by the light and warmth of our lives, God's presence to all we meet.

I ask you this with praise and grateful thanksgiving. Amen.

## SAINT'S CORNER

### St. Charles Borromeo 1538 – 1584

Charles Borromeo was born into a family of means in Italy on October 2, 1538. He was a boy of 12 when he received tonsure, the official initiation into the ranks of the clergy. In 1559 he received the degree of doctor of laws. That same year his mother's brother was elected Pope Pius IV. Within a few months the new pope had called Charles, then 21, to Rome to help in administering the affairs of the Church.



Charles was given the rank of cardinal to go with his position as personal assistant to the Pope. In 1563 Charles was ordained a priest and consecrated Archbishop of Milan. He brought about proper religious instructions in the parishes, saw that the elaborate worship rituals were toned, and built a new seminary for the proper training of the clergy.

When the plague of 1576-1578 struck Milan, Charles spent much of his time nursing the sick. He died on November 3, 1584 and was canonized in 1610.

Borromeo is usually represented in his robes, barefoot, carrying the cross; a rope around his neck, one hand raised in blessing, thus recalling his work during the plague.

### Saint Martin of Tours

When a mere boy, Martin became a Christian catechumen against his parents' wishes and at 15 was therefore seized by his father, a pagan soldier, and enrolled in the army. One winter's day, when stationed at Amiens, he met a beggar almost naked and frozen with cold. Having no money, he cut his cloak in two and gave him the half. That night he saw Our Lord clothed in the half cloak, and heard Him say to the angels: "Martin, yet a catechumen, hath wrapped Me in this garment." He decided to be baptized, and shortly after he left the army. He succeeded in converting his mother; but, being driven from his home by the Arians, he took shelter with St. Hilary, and founded near Poitiers the first monastery in France. In 372 he was made Bishop of Tours. His flock, though Christian in name, was still pagan in heart. Unarmed and attended only by his monks, Martin destroyed the heathen temples and groves, and completed by his preaching and miracles the conversion of the people, whence he is known as the Apostle of Gaul. His last eleven years were spent in humble toil to atone for his faults, while God made manifest by miracles the purity of his soul.



### St. Josaphat 1580 – 1623

Josaphat is one of those figures in history caught in a web of controversy. He was caught in a battle between Catholic and Orthodox, Latin and Byzantine, and found himself criticized and opposed on every side.

He was born in Lithuania about 1580 into a Catholic family and early promoted Catholic unity in a country divided between Orthodox and Catholic. He entered the Byzantine monastery in 1604 and was elected Catholic Archbishop of Polotsk in 1614.

Politically, the Catholic and Orthodox clergy were rivals in Lithuania, and an Orthodox Archbishop of Polotsk was appointed and Josaphat was accused of taking office invalidly.

One of the hotbeds of trouble in Josaphat's diocese was Witebsk, in November 1623 he went there to bring about peace in his flock, preaching in the churches and trying to reconcile differences. On November 12, a mob broke into the house, shouting hatred and violence. When he confronted them, he was struck in the head with a halberd and shot. His mangled body was dragged out and thrown into the river. He was canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1867.



### St. Andrew Dung-Lac

On June 19, 1988, Pope John Paul II canonized a group of 117 martyrs who died for the Roman Catholic Faith in Vietnam during the nineteenth century. The group was made up of ninety-six Vietnamese, eleven Spaniards, and ten French.

St. Andrew Dung-Lac, who represents this group of heroes, was a Vietnamese diocesan priest. He came from a poor, non-Christian family and was taught by a Christian lay catechist. He worked in the missions with the priests of the Foreign Mission Society of Paris. He was imprisoned and repeatedly tortured during the persecutions of Minh-Meng, the emperor of Vietnam between 1820 and 1840 who was famed for his persecutions of the Christians.

This feast day gives testament to the sufferings inflicted on the Vietnamese Church, which are among the most terrible in the long history of Christian martyrdom.



### Implementation of the Roman Missal Third Edition

What can I do to make the process of change a good one for my parish? Everyone has a role to play in preparing to use the new translations:

- Study the new texts with an open heart and an open mind so that you will be ready to use them in the Liturgy.
- Take advantage of opportunities to learn more about the new texts by attending catechetical programs and reading articles about the new texts.
- Offer to assist your pastor or parish director of religious education in preparing parish catechetical events.
- If you are a parent, teach your children the new prayers and help them to understand the changes. Encourage them to participate in the Mass fully and to learn more about their faith.
- Be very intentional about celebrating the Liturgy each Sunday and holy day. Arrive on time (or a bit early). Pray and sing with attentiveness. Stay focused on the action of the Liturgy rather than letting your mind wander. Hold the Sacrament of the Eucharist in great reverence. Finally, give thanks to God in your heart for so great a gift.



**Pro-Life  
October, 2011**

There is a provincial election coming and you have an opportunity to let those in your riding know what is important to you in the governance of Saskatchewan. As a Roman Catholic, you are pro-life from the moment of conception to natural death. It is a mortal sin to have an abortion, to suggest or assist someone to have an abortion, or to support others who allow or promote abortions. This is a matter of life and death. There are no grey areas. You either believe it is wrong to take an innocent human life, or it is not.

While the legality of abortion is a federal matter, the funding of abortion falls under the provinces' jurisdiction over health care. The Canada Health Act requires provincial health insurance plans to fund medically necessary services, but it does not define abortion as medically necessary. If Saskatchewan legislators deem an elective procedure to not be medically necessary, it does not get insured.

Now is the time to force politicians to feel the heat. We need to do everything we can to send the message that the millions spent on abortions annually can and must be directed toward genuine areas of health care. Abortion is such an easily available option at no cost to anyone but the taxpayer. As Catholics we do not want to pay for an action at odds with our faith and morals. We need to drop abortion from the list of procedures covered by provincial tax dollars. Defunding abortions is a huge step toward making abortion unthinkable.

Sign the petition at the entrances to the church and let the candidates know when they come knocking on your door, what your wishes are in respect to this important subject.

# PROVINCIAL ELECTION

November 7, 2011

## QUESTIONS FOR CANDIDATES

1. Do you support the protection of human life from conception to natural death? **Abortion is the deliberate killing of a pre-born child. Euthanasia is the deliberate ending of a human life after birth. For life support to be removed where treatment is not of benefit to the patient, or if the patient asks to have treatment discontinued, is not euthanasia.** Would you advocate strong penalties for those involved in Euthanasia or Assisted Suicide?
2. Would you support legislation that requires consent from parents before an abortion is performed on minor children? **Currently, there is no enforceable law in this regard.**
3. Would you support an amendment to the Saskatchewan Human Rights Act to protect pro-life people from discrimination because of their belief that life begins at conception? **There is no protection in Saskatchewan for health care workers who refuse to work in abortion-performing operations.**
4. Would you support Informed Consent Legislation that requires medical doctors or hospitals to provide specific information as to known risks of abortion, abortion options, and the stage of development of her unborn child to a woman requesting an abortion? **Ultrasound**
5. Would you support the removal of funding by tax dollars for abortion procedures? **Currently there are over 2,000 babies killed every year by abortion in Saskatchewan. Surgical or medical intervention to save the life of the mother, e.g. tubal pregnancy or cervical cancer, which results in unintended death of the baby is not abortion.**
6. Would you support the removal of government funding to special interest groups? **In the past one of the Province of Saskatchewan District Health Boards provided funding to Planned Parenthood, a notorious organization for abortion on demand.**
