Jesus, Servant Leader

John, miracle son of Zechariah and Elizabeth, cousin of Jesus and known as "the Baptist," offers a "baptism of repentance." Then Jesus shows up. The eternal Son of God a penitent? John is shocked and resists, saying it is Jesus who should baptize him. But Jesus insists, "to fulfill all righteousness" (Matthew 3:15).


At the very beginning of his ministry, Jesus is humbling himself, much as he did toward the end, when he washed the feet of his disciples. Then it was Peter who would resist what seemed inappropriate by the standards of this world. Jesus is giving us an example, the way of the servant leader, as described in today's beautiful passage from Isaiah. Jesus is the servant leader, the Father's Son, over whom the Holy Spirit danced like a dove, and the Father, with his booming voice from the heavens, said of him, "This is my beloved Son!" (Matthew 3:17).

Jesus allowing himself to be baptized may seem like a contradiction, but given all that follows, we know he is offering his followers a consistent model of what he expects from those who choose to be his disciples. As St.

Paul would later write to the Church in Philippi, "Have among yourselves the same attitude that is also yours in Christ Jesus, who, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped" (Philippians 2:5-6). ●

Throughout 2024, the mainstream press woke up to a brutal reality: Despite decades of sinister fearmongering about “over population”, the world is experiencing a critical shortage of babies that will threaten our way of life in every way imaginable.

Was Jesus really born on December 25?

The Early Church believed that Jesus was crucified on March 25 (given when Passover normally falls), and there was a tradition that Jesus died the same day he first entered the world at his conception. Nine months after March 25 is December 25.

But Scripture itself provides strong evidence that December 25, or a date near that, is the date Jesus was born.

The Gospel of Luke tells us that the angel Gabriel revealed to Zechariah that his wife Elizabeth would conceive John the Baptist while Zechariah was performing his priestly duties on the Day of Atonement, also known as Yom Kippur. That Jewish holy day always falls in late September or early October.

Luke also tells us that, after Gabriel announced to Mary that she would conceive Jesus, she went in haste to visit Elizabeth, and that Elizabeth was in the sixth month of her pregnancy.

Now do the math: If Elizabeth conceived in late September, and Mary visited her in her sixth month, this means Mary conceived Jesus in late March, that places his birth in late December.

So it's very possible the Early Church got it right, and December 25 really is Jesus' birthday.

The Three Wise Men

Is the story of the Three Wise Men a "midrash", a Jewish tale configured to fulfil an Old Testament Prophecy, or comment on a passage of Scripture, a delightful parable or pious fiction?

Fr. Dwight Longenecker did some research. After peeling away layers of tradition and legend, he found that the historical facts fit Matthew's simple account perfectly.

The wise men were diplomats from the neighboring kingdom of the Nabateans. Centered on the famous city of Petra, the Nabatean King Aretas IV had every motivation to cement an alliance with Herod the Great. When the Magi at his court discerned that a new heir to the Judean throne was born, he sent them as envoys to Herod's court to pay homage.

Their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh were diplomatic offerings, representative of the Arabian kingdom. With a Jewish background and knowing the Old Testament prophecies, they would also have been searching for the coming Messiah. These and many other details came together as he delved deep into the history.

Why was the identity of the wise men not discovered earlier? For a long time the Nabatean civilization was lost to historians. Their culture in Northwest Arabia drifted into the ruins of the desert sands and because there was no written history, very little was known about them. More recently, advanced techniques of archeology and forensics, combined with new sciences like archeoastronomy, have provided more clues to the identity of the wise men.

When Pope Francis heard about the 21 Copts killed by ISIS in Libya in 2015, he said this: "It makes no difference whether they be Catholics, Orthodox, Copts, or Protestants. They are Christians!... Their blood confesses Christ." He was tapping into a powerful intuition. There is something in the stories of Christian martyrs—both those killed centuries ago and those killed much more recently—that might inspire, instruct, and draw together otherwise divided Christians.

In the first lecture, we examine the basic claim that a history of martyrdom serves as a resource for ecumenism. By exploring the stories and legacies of some particular martyrs, we can see how unity and solidarity might be expressed, but also some of the challenges and tensions.

In the second lecture, we look at one major barrier—the history of Christians killing Christians. During the Reformation, for example, the execution of fellow Christians was justified on theological grounds, some of those killed honoured as martyrs by some. How do we reckon with this history in ways that do justice to the past, and promote reconciliation and unity in the future?

We look at one major barrier — the history of Christians killing Christians. During the Reformation, the execution of fellow Christians was justified on theological grounds, and some of those killed are honoured as martyrs by some churches. How do we reckon with this history in ways that do justice to the past, and promote reconciliation and unity in the future?

A training session for facilitators of synodal "Conversation in the Spirit"


